A pilot had to make an emergency landing at Kenley Airfield last month, when he exerienced engine problems shortly after taking off from Biggin Hill. On Sunday, 13th April hundreds of people were strolling, jogging, cycling or walking their dogs around the airfield while gliders of 615 Volunteer Gliding Squadron took to the skies above their heads.

Fortunately, the private owner landed his ailing aircraft without further incident and the emergency services were stood down before they arrived. On the following Tuesday engineers repaired the aircraft which then returned to its base at Biggin Hill. Adrian added: "When all the initial excitement had died down, the incident underlined the fact that Kenley Airfield is just that, an airfield, and aircraft in serious difficulties will choose to land there, whether or not the gliders of 615 VGS or Surrey Hills Gliding Club are operating. ## Smartening up Caterham

Following the ABC 'A Better Caterham' Town Healthcheck last year, ABC will be focusing on three main areas: 'Shabby to Smart' ('S2S') in the short term, the Community Hub in the medium term and the redevelopment of the north end of the town centre, including the Rose & Young site, in the long term. In order to take the S2S project forward, a committee of volunteers from Caterham-on-the-Hill

and Caterham Valley have been listing areas for attention, which include reviewing the capacity of the drains system, commercial rubbish collection, railings, street furniture, signage and street greenery. They are also looking into ways to improve parking. Following on from the Healthcheck, this process is the next stage in preparing a bid for funding from SEEDA, the South East England Development Agency.

#### Museum commemorates the 'Father of Modern Caterham'

The East Surrey Museum in Caterham Valley is hosting an exhibition commemorating the life and work of William Garland Soper who died 100 years ago this year.

William came to Caterham in 1866 and was instrumental in the town's development. So significant were his contributions to Caterham, The Soper Hall was built in his memory in 1911. Opening times are 10.00am - 5.00pm Wednesdays and Saturdays and 2.00pm -5.00pm on Sundays.

## Recruiting and retaining good teachers by Mark Phillips

#### Headteacher of de Stafford School

Students at de Stafford are lucky to have some very good teachers who have stayed at the school and are able to offer them a very stable learning environment.

However, this is not the case in all Surrey schools. Headteachers in Surrey know how hard it is to replace good teachers when they move on, and it is no longer a problem confined to just Maths and Science. Five years ago, if I placed an advert for a History teacher, I would have received at least fifteen good applications. Having just placed a national advert two weeks ago, I received only one very poor application from a teacher not even living in the UK; this is the case for most areas of the curriculum.

As an older teacher (painful as it is for me to admit to) with over twenty years teaching experience, I am looking at a changed profession where newly qualified teachers only stay in the role for an average of five years before moving on to another career. Many of those leaving the profession are highly talented but simply cannot afford to live in this area on the salary that is paid to new teachers. Surrey schools are faced with an additional problem: when we do find excellent young people who want to pursue a career in education we find ourselves unable to compete with schools in Croydon and the inner London Boroughs, who are funded to pay higher



salaries through the London Allowance system. The cost of living is no different in Caterham to Croydon and yet members of our staff are paid less.

I am sure that everyone in the local community wants the best for our children, and to achieve this we must encourage the government and County Council to invest in schools, ensuring that we can attract the best teachers to stav in this area. Unlike other public sector professions that the media uses to compare teachers to, this is a career only open to graduates and must be able to offer the same rewards as other careers at this level.

#### 'Tis the season to go fishing!

For both experienced flyfishermen and newcomers to the sport, the tranquil lake at Leigh Mill is one of Godstone's hidden treasures. Set in three acres of beautiful woodland, the private lake is fed by a fresh water spring and two underground springs, providing well-oxygenated water where fish thrive. As home to Leigh Mill Fly Fishing Syndicate, the lake is stocked every three to four weeks with top quality rainbow and occasionally brown trout.

Fishing is growing in popularity, especially amongst women. There are approximately four million anglers in this country, more than in any other sport. Describing the appeal of the sport, Club member, Doug Newdick said: "Once you have hooked that first fish the adrenalin gets you going and you are hooked! It's a bit like playing golf and trying to get a hole in one every time."

Fellow member, Andrew Sampson added: "You are constantly doing something with fly fishing, you never stand still. It requires a lot of concentration so you find you forget about everything else which is very therapeutic."

Many youngsters are also finding the sport a refreshing alternative to spending hours indoors in front of computer games. Junior angler, Henrik Wetter, said: "I enjoy fly fishing both for the challenge of casting the right fly, in the right place at the right time and the excitement of hooking and playing the fish. Although I release most of the fish I catch, I also love eating trout! And all that in beautiful surroundings...."

The Syndicate has a limited number of openings for new members - not just experienced anglers but newcomers to the sport too and tuition is available for beginners. The Society welcomes men and women and also juniors who must be

You may remember me writing about Neighbourhood Panels and how the Caterham community really does influence the policing priorities in the area. At the end of March I attended the Caterham-on-the-Hill panel meeting and was able to discuss the on-going issues raised around tackling antisocial behaviour in the area. Another concern was vehicle vandalism, in particular in Oak Road. I can assure you my team is doing all they can to resolve the situation by providing suitable longterm solutions. The next meeting is on Wednesday, 28th May, and I hope you will all be able to attend.

I am looking forward to attending the Caterham Valley Parish Council AGM on Tuesday, 13th May, and to meeting as many of you as possible.

Last month, BBC One's Crimewatch reconstructed the sexual assault that occurred in Whyteleafe in December. At the time of the incident I used my column to appeal for anyone with information to come forward. For those of you who saw the programme I am sure you will agree this was a violent and terrifying attack on two young women. A team of detectives from Caterham CID are investi-



gating this assault but I would again urge anyone who has any information about the incident to please pick up the phone and speak with officers at Surrey Police on 0845 125 2222 or call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Sadly car crime seems to have increased in Tandridge recently. We had a spate of criminal damage caused to vehicles parked at Morrisons car park in April and we have also seen a rise in the number of thefts from motor vehicles. My crime reduction officer, PC John Lee, and I have met with Morrisons' area security manager and advised on different ways their car park security can be improved. We are working with Morrisons towards the Safer Car Park award. Motorists can also play their part by not leaving valuables on display. Simple measures can drastically reduce your chances of becoming a victim of vehicle crime and by implementing these changes, and working together, we can crack vehicle crime. #### Credit Crunch -**Global Meltdown** or Opportunity?

'Recession', 'Market Meltdown', 'Mortgage May-hem', 'FTSE Crashing', 'Banking Collapse'.

As spring flowering bulbs and plants begin to fade, perhaps now is the time to horder consider а makeover. Borders can become somewhat sad looking as the individual shrubs and plants become straggly but it is not necessary to dig out everything and start again. Some mature planting is a valuable asset to any garden and a good pruning may well revive many small trees, shrubs and

climbers. Some plants are relatively short lived and some do not respond to hard pruning after being neglected. These include Lavatera, most rock roses (cistus) and broom (cytisus). Also, most conifers do not re-grow from old wood, so extra care is needed when cutting back.

Once well-past-their-best shrubs have been removed and the remaining have been cut back, you will have an idea as to the number of new plants that will be required.

Perennials live for at least two years and usually many more and most herbaceous varieties will die back in the autumn and can be cut back to ground level. There are thousands of perennials available and they will provide splashes of colour throughout the summer and early autumn. Some are evergreen and, therefore, will provide both colour and valuable ground cover in winter.

If you are purchasing from garden centres, you will find many beautiful perennials available. They come in all shapes and sizes, in many different colours and a herbaceous border can be designed to emphasise the style you have chosen for your garden.

As is the case with all plants, care should be taken to ensure that they are suitable for both the aspect and soil conditions. Plants that require protection from strong winds are unlikely to thrive in an open aspect. Likewise, acid-loving plants, such as azaleas, camellias, dwarf rhododendrons and heathers are not likely to tolerate an alkaline soil. Such is the standard of most garden centres now that information on individual shrubs is readily available, usually on the plant label. If you are in doubt as to a plant's suitability, seek expert advice before buving it. Happy gardening.
