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# New youth centre for Caterham

On Friday 23rd January Surrey County Council exchanged contracts for the lease of premises in Godstone Road in the centre of Caterham Valley, which will provide a brand new youth facility. Surrey County Councillor for Caterham Valley, Sally Marks, said: "This is Marks, said: something that I have worked hard for over the last couple of years and I know that the community will be pleased to see that this project is about to take shape. The second highest priority of the residents during the 'ABC Healthcheck' survey was to see more facilities for young people in the town

and we are delivering." The new youth centre will include a 'Youth Café' to provide an exciting, vibrant and safe place for young people to meet.

There will also be support services for young people based on the premises and youngsters themselves are being involved in the design of the project. Sally added: "I have ensured that Surrey County Council will deliver on its promise to provide youth services in the town and I look forward to this fantastic project being realised in a few months' time. I will keep you updated on the progress of this project."

# *Marie Curie Chief Executive to meet with local campaigner*

This month the Chief Executive of Marie Curie, Thomas Hughes-Hallett is to meet members of the campaign team that is fighting the closure of the Caterham hospice, led by Richard Holloway. Last month Richard organised a demonstration outside the hospice in Caterham Valley which was attended by around 200 people from Caterham and beyond, protesting at the hospice's closure at the end of March.

On 28th January a deal was announced in principle that Surrey Primary Care Trust and St. Catherine's Hospice in Crawley will ensure the continuation of local end of life services. Detailed planning is underway to ensure the services will be developed in time for March 31st.

Campaign organiser, Richard Holloway, commented: "We remain very cautious about the situation, particularly as the Marie Curie HQ is continuing to release misleading information about the number of patients which were treated at the hospice last year and about the 'benefits' of the proposed new nursing service, which continues to be condemned by just about every health care professional in the region."

Bill was born in Caterham in 1939 and became an apprentice watchmaker to his father John Joseph ('JJ') Browne at the age of 15. In 1964 Bill married Anne, who worked in a local Estate Agents office, and they had three sons, Andrew, James and Ivan. During the memorial service warm tributes were made to Bill who was described as an exceptional man who showed genuine interest in the people he encountered in business, many of whom became friends. ## Snow chaos -Council fails to treat key routes

Although the snow was forecast, no-one expected 12 inches of snow to fall in such a short space of time on the afternoon/evening of Sunday 1st February. Within hours, cars were stranded and shops had sold out of milk and bread as residents prepared for siege conditions. Walking was soon the only way to get from Caterham Valley to Caterham-on-the-Hill and vice versa, thanks to the Council's failure to grit the roads. John Orrick from Cater-

ham-on-the-Hill, pointed out: "Despite Church Hill, the High Street, Whyteleafe Road, Chaldon Road, Westway and Coulsdon Road all meeting Surrey County Council's own criteria for priority treatment (bus routes, schools, hospital, steep gradient, ambulance station), the only one treated after two days was Church Hill and that at the specific request of the Dene Hospital who had to admit new patients! They also failed to refill grit boxes after the last snow we had so residents were not able to complete the task of clearing footpaths and in some cases roads. Surrey must fill these boxes as a high priority immediately they have concluded the task of opening all routes, and certainly before the next cold snap."

# Burtenshaw's Beat

This month sees the launch of Tandridge's first No Cold Calling Zone in Woldingham. I am very excited about this scheme as it will help residents to deal with uninvited callers safely. It's a joint initiative between Surrey Police and Surrey Trading Standards and will cover an area of around 850 homes. The scheme is being supported by Woldingham Parish Council. Neighbourhood Watch and the Woldingham Association.

The No Cold Calling Zone will really help to reinforce the work Surrey Police is already doing in advising residents on what to do when a stranger calls and making them aware of the methods used by distraction burglars.

We want people to feel safe in their homes and able to turn people away without having to worry. Remember, genuine callers will not mind waiting while you check their details.

On a separate subject, during the recent cold snap a number of roads in



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Tandridge had to be closed for safety reasons. Unfortunately, some people ignored the road closure signs and attempted to use these roads, potentially putting their lives at risk.

Deciding to close a road is taken in order to protect those who use the public highways. Whilst a diversion might add extra minutes to your journey, please do not ignore road closures in future because they are there to ensure Surrey's roads are safe.

Finally, can I remind motorists not to leave valuables on display in their vehicles. We are continuing to see thefts from motor vehicles when expensive items, such as SatNavs and laptops, tools, are clearly visible. Do not even leave items in your boot as a thief will search there too. Crime prevention advice is available on our website, www.surrey.police.uk/ but the main message is: 'Do not give thieves an easy opportunity'.







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# Local student treks across the Sinai desert for 'Jigsaw4U'

Coping with the loss of a parent can be a traumatic and lonely experience for a youngster, and the UK based charity 'Jigsaw4U' has worked for ten years to help children, young people and their families during times of grief.

At the age of 12 back in 2003, de Stafford pupil Ian Kugler tragically lost his father after he suffered a heart attack. Jigsaw4U provided support for Ian and his mother, and last year Ian embarked on an expedition to cross the Sinai desert to raise money for the charity that helped him.

"I was part of a group of young people from Surrey aged between 12 and 23 years of age who had all been helped by Jigsaw4U," said Ian. "I only heard about the expedition in March 2008 which gave me just three months to raise the £2,800 sponsorship

money I needed to take part in the expedition. de Stafford were brilliant, organising a Mufti Day, cake sale and sports events to help me raise the money. Miss Cassie even managed to get hold of a signed Crystal Palace shirt which we auctioned off."

Ian spent the first two days of the three week trip getting acclimatised to the heat, then the group visited a youth centre in Assala where the Bedouin people live, before setting off on the trip across the desert.

"It was scary at first!" re-called Ian. "Our feet sunk deep into the sand and we had to take snake and scorpion anti-venom tablets. One of my friends was about to put his sock on and there was a scorpion in it! At one point I became dehydrated and nearly collapsed. Apart from that I had a fantastic experience and made some great friends."

Now at Reigate College, Ian is planning to travel with the Caterham Overseas Aid Trust (COAT) to Kenya this year to help the children at a school in Kimillili.






