New day care services for hospice patients

St Catherine's Hospice and NHS Surrey have agreed in principle to the opening of new day care services in Caterham for patients receiving end of life care.

A St Catherine's day care services centre will open at Dormers in Foxon Lane, Caterham in early April. The building is owned by Surrey County Council's social services department who have agreed to let St Catherine's Hospice set up the services on the site.

The eight-room wing will provide a day centre to cater for patients in the East Surrey area receiving specialised end of life care. It will give patients who are being cared for at home the opportunity to meet others at regular day hospice sessions, to share concerns and feelings about their illness in a supportive environment.

As the services develop, patients will be able to

take part in creative activities, receive complementary therapies, counselling, spiritual support and advice on welfare issues. Family members, friends and carers will also have access to a range of services. Shaun O'Leary, Chief Executive of St Catherine's, said: "We are delighted to be able to offer this local facility to people in the East Surrey area. We know how important it is for patients to have the chance to access day services in a welcoming setting, and we have made it a priority to ensure that we could provide this as soon as possible."

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News Flash from Surrey Community Foundation

Surrey Community Foundation is pleased to announce that the Grassroots Grants programme, from which over £300,000 has already been awarded to 91 small community and voluntary groups in Surrey, is now open to community groups with an annual income of less than £30,000.

Surrey Community Foundation was successful in securing £1 million to support community and voluntary groups in Surrey by awarding grants of up to £5,000. The remaining £700,000 will now be available to even more voluntary and community groups across Surrey as the programme has been extended to groups with an annual income below £30,000. (Previously, the grant programme was only open to groups with an annual income below £20,000)

This announcement was made recently by the Office of the Third Sector, responsible for funding the programme.

Previous Grants awarded in the Tandridge area include £5,000 towards the running costs of The Hatch, a support group for young mothers from Fetcham, and £5,000 towards club house repairs at Limpsfield Chart Cricket Club. Community Foundation



New venues sought for Arc's activities

Tandridge Leisure Ltd., the operators of the Arc in Caterham-on-the-Hill, is searching for alternative sites to continue to provide the Arc's soft play and creative activities after they leave the Arc at the end of March.

On September 31st 2008 Tandridge Leisure gave notice to leave to the Caterham Barracks Community Trust as they are no longer able to pay the mortgage on the building. The Trust spent in excess of £1.3 million to develop the building and has a mortgage of £600,000 which has to be repaid. Until now Tandridge Leisure has only been repaying the interest on the borrowing and it has reached the point where repayment of the capital is due to start. It is this increased cost which forced Tandridge Leisure to give notice that they would

have to leave the building. The soft play space and cafe will close at 4pm on Sunday 22nd March and the workshop, studio and gallery space from Satur-

day 29th March. Angry local parents have held a demonstration and launched a petition in a desperate bid to save the Arc which has proved to be a hit with families from in and around the district.

The Trust's Chair, Sara Corker said "It is very disappointing that the ARC may have to close its doors and the Trust find new ways of supplying the opportunities created by this lovely building. The Trust is committed to creating sustainable community facilities and will look for new ways to keep this building available for the people of Caterham. It is a matter of regret to the Trust that Tandridge Leisure was unable to meet the business plan targets set and agreed for the building."

Famous local landmark celebrates 50 years

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, or the 'Mormon Temple' as it is known locally, has been an impressive landmark by the A22 in Newchapel for the last 50 years. In 2008 the church celebrated its 50th anniversary since being built in Newchapel, and to mark the occasion, an 8ft statue of the Angel Moroni was commissioned to stand on top of the tem-

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ple's tall spire. The statue, covered in gold leaf, was lifted by helicopter from the grounds of the temple then hovered above the spire while a team of workmen threaded the lengthy lightening conductor down through the spire before the angel itself could be carefully lowered into position. Clearly visible from the sky, and directly underneath the flypath of planes landing at Gatwick airport, the temple has also been a landmark for pilots over the years.

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Burtenshaw's Beat

I write this column having just returned from supporting my neighbourhood staff who responded to a crime reported through the Caterham Shopwatch radio scheme. People matching the suspects' description were stopped at Caterham station, items were recovered and two people are now being interviewed in relation to the offence. This sends a clear message to those who commit crime in Tandridge and it clearly demonstrates the benefit of police working with partners be they business or the community in combating crime.

Last month we had the worst weather conditions for more than thirty years. Officers from Surrey Police work with the Highways Agency and Surrey County Council to ensure Surrey's roads and pavements are safe. Due to the treacherous weather conditions and the fact that the area is very hilly, a number of roads were closed to prevent further motorists be-



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coming stuck and avoid further collisions.

However, despite all the weather warnings and Surrey Police advising motorists only to travel if absolutely necessary, I and my staff saw motorists blatantly ignoring these signs and thus putting themselves and others in the position of potentially being injured. This is the third month that I have written about inconsiderate and dangerous road use by motorists and I know that to the majority of the community road safety is paramount from the issues that are raised to me and my staff at panels, surgeries and by email. The Tandridge Safer Neighbourhood Team will continue in our endeavour to make the roads safer and respond to your concerns but I need you to play your part too. I am urging road users to think about their driving standards and the impact their actions could have.







Local project initiative gets off to a good start at de Stafford

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An authentic taste of

Spain at Casa Lola

Review by Julia Church Caterham may not be the how clean and tidy the sunniest of climes at present, but it's easy to create the illusion of being in the Mediterannean if you spend an evening in our local Spanish restaurant, Casa Lola. Gio the owner has created a Spanish haven, with the decor, music and food to transport you into a world of continental conviviality, without needing a passport.

When I visited the restaurant recently, I noticed that despite the large number of diners, the spacious atmosphere enabled easy conversation, without being drowned out by the other diners.

It was the first visit to Casa Lola for my friend Keith, and his first impression was restaurant felt. He especially liked the layout of the restaurant and the attractive Spanish tiles.

Despite being tempted by Paella, sea bass, steak and a number of other main courses, my friend and I decided to opt for a selection of tapas dishes to share. We ordered Gambas al Ajillo (prawns in a garlic, chilli and white wine sauce), Calamares (deep friend squid in batter), Raxo (pork fillets Galician style), Espinacas con Nata (spinach with garlic, chilli, cheese and cream - one of favourites!) and a my mixed salad. I asked for some bread - essential to soak up the delicious juices! The waiter also

brought up a bowl of Tortilla chips for us to dip into the Espinacas. To accompany our meal, we had a bottle of 'Amapola 2007', a medium sweet wine from Penedes in Spain - perfect. After letting our delicious main course go down, I must admit we were tempted to order dessert and these proved to be just as mouthwatering as the tapas dishes. Keith chose the Cesto de Frut A, a vanilla ice cream and forest fruit sorbet coated with a raspberry sauce -"The best pudding I have ever tasted!" he said. I had Fillous de la Casa, a cold pancake filled with cream and topped with Tia Maria.

Afterwards, it somehow didn't feel right stepping out into the cold night air. Where was the sound of the cicadas and the smell of bougainvillea?

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In the garden

So, what have you done in the garden over the last three months? Whatever your answer to that question, now is the time to plan and prepare for the coming spring and summer months.

Gardening covers a wide spectrum and there are many benefits to be gained by planning now what you wish to achieve later in the year, relative to budget, experience and time available. Whether you are looking at a new area for flower beds or a vegetable patch, or replacing existing plants and shrubs, a very basic, but important, requirement for success, is the soil. Cultivating the soil by digging or forking it over will help provide suitable conditions for good growth by aerating the soil and breaking up the surface crust. The addition of organic mate-

incorporated at, or just before, the time of planting. Try to dig over on a day when the soil is reasonably dry as working on wet ground is more likely to compact the soil. Compaction results in poor drainage and aeration, both of which affect growing conditions adversely. For plants and shrubs to grow and flourish over a period of years, the soil requires a good structure through which water, nutrients and a certain amount of air can circulate. Worms provide valuable assistance and the addition of garden com-

will be forced to use poor posture for some exercises.

There are numerous ways to progress when using a stability ball. Here are a few ways to increase the difficulty level when using this piece of equipment. 1. Change the base of sup-

port. By decreasing the base of support for an exercise you can increase the challenge of balance. To do this add more air to the ball and bring the feet closer together in order to narrow the base support. 2. Increase the range of motion - increasing movement from a smaller to a larger motion increases the difficulty level.

For example if you are doing push-ups with your hands on the ball you can progress from doing partial range of movement to full range of movement.

 Vary the speed of movement; the challenge of stability within the exercise can be raised by changing the speed of the exercise and this can range from fast to slow.
Add resistance to your exercise. For example, use a free weight or a cable machine.

5. Finally, try closing your eyes! This will increase propriceptive demand on your body and introduce a whole new element to any exercise.

These days you would be hard pressed to find anyone who isn't feeling the pinch, and the same goes for local charities - they are strapped for cash at the best of times.
