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Is the end in sight for the Rose & Young 'eyesore'?

Building contractors, GB Development Solutions have announced that they are progressing proposals for the redevelopment of the long derelict Rose & Young site on Croydon Road, Caterham.

In a statement sent to The Caterham and District Independent, the developers said that they recognise the site has become a matter of great local concern and are keen to progress their scheme which envisages a four-storey residential block in a distinctive design at this important gateway site to the town centre. Glenn Mills, MD of GB Development Solutions said: "Tandridge District Council has a clear objective to encourage redevelopment plans for Caterham. They have responded positively to our initiative and we are working with them towards the submission of a Planning Application. This is in the knowledge that the Council would, subject to a risk assessment, be prepared to support a

Compulsory Purchase Order procedure should the owner remain unwilling to negotiate with us regarding our desire to acquire the site and deliver a satisfactory scheme which has planning approval."

The news has delighted the members of the Rose & Young Action Group who met with the Planning Officers of Tandridge District Council back in December 2009 to discuss the Council's Core Strategy from October 2008 in which it stated that: "The Council will actively pursue the development of the Rose & Young site."

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

The January 2010 edition of The Caterham and District Independent reported the meeting between the Rose & Young Action Group and the Planning Officers, when Bob Evans, Head of Planning at Tandridge District Council said that given their Core Strategy, the Council's priority would be to encourage redevelopment in any way that contributes overall to this part of Caterham. No specific preconditions on schemes would be likely to be an obstacle.

Mr Evans added that he would welcome informal discussion with any groups with potential schemes.

Following last January's article, Mr Evans was pleased to hear from various developers seeking to discuss possible schemes for the site, including a scheme put forward by GB Development Solutions.

Following the building conrecent press antractor's nouncement Bob Evans said: 'We very much welcome the interest shown by GB Development Solutions in this site. We are heartened by their commitment to bring forward proposals and look forward to sharing details of their scheme with local residents and businesses as soon as a planning application is made." The timing of the Planning Application will depend on the outcome of negotiations with the current owners of the site in respect of the acquisition by GB Development Solutions, and detailed pre-application consultations with Tandridge District Council and other interested parties.

Tandridge District Councillor for Caterham Valley, Jane Ingham, who sits on the Planning Committee, said: "This building has for far too long been a blight on our town and has



Surrey County Councillor for Caterham Valley, Sally Marks also expressed her reaction to the news, saying: "I am delighted to hear that we have a group interested in developing this infamous local eyesore. The current situation is appalling and frankly almost anything would be better than what we have now. What I cannot understand is why the previous and current owners of the site could not have provided the town with much needed parking space over the last 20 years - this would have been so simple and an income stream for the owners. Instead they have ignored pleas from the community to do the decent thing and just 'mothballed' this ugly building, making it a health and safety hazard and ensuring that the town's fortunes are severely compromised."

Tandridge District Council is seeking residents', businesses' and community groups' views about new planning policies and the Green Belt settlements, as part of a consultation starting on Friday 28th



. Councilor David Weightman, Chairman of the Planning Policy Committee, said: "These documents are an important next step in preparing the planning framework for the district. We would encourage local residents, community groups and businesses to get involved and help us draw up these important documents. Residents in the villages will be particularly interested in the discussion paper about the Green Belt Settlements, as this will affect what level of development will happen in their communities in the future."

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Frustration as Council defers decision on the future of Caterham's Soper Hall until June

At a meeting on Monday 24th January, the Resources Committee of Tandridge District Council ('TDC') decided to defer its decision about the future of the Soper Hall in Caterham until June.

In a statement issued after the meeting TDC said: "The options regarding the Soper Hall included transferring the building to either the Soper Hall Community Centre Ltd. ('SHCCL') or Caterham Bap-tist Church. Both of these options would make the hall available for community use. TDC has agreed to provide up to £100,000 matched funding over two years to either organisation, to help with a transfer and on the understanding the Caterham and Warlingham Citizens Advice Bureau, Tandridge Voluntary Service Council and Lions Talking Newspaper would continue to be based at the building.

"The Committee decided more information is needed before a final decision is made to ensure whatever

happens is in the best interests of the local community. More details will be requested around the resilience and the robustness of SHCCL's business plan and clarification of the Church's proposals for community use and any restrictions it may place on users."

The decision came as a disappointment to the Soper Hall Group, who, as the SHCCL, put forward a comprehensive plan for a multifunction community centre. Chairman of the Soper Hall Group Graham Tapley said, "This is not only extremely disappointing for the Group, but also for the many residents of Caterham who have shown their support. Our main message was 'Support the asset transfer of the building to a Community Group, for the widest possible benefit of the community'.'

Caterham Baptist Church is looking for new premises to develop its activities as its Beechwood Road site is not

While the large enough. building would be primarily used for church activities, it would also accommodate other users of the building

and community use. TDC said: "Each group will be invited to a special challenge session to discuss their proposals in more depth with the Chairman of the Resources Committee, Councillor Martin Fisher, the Vice-Chairman, Councillor Simon Ainsworth, the Chief

Executive, Stephen Weigel and other council officers. In addition, Surrey County Council has approached TDC and would like to explore the potential for setting up a public services Hub in the building, similar to the one in Oxted."

Chairman of the Resources Committee, Councillor Martin Fisher, said: "We are looking for the best solution for the community and the Council, so we need to consider the proposals in more depth at the challenge sessions before we make a final decision. I am pleased the debate at last night's meeting had cross party support. While it is not financially viable for the Council to keep the building as it is, we must make sure that the outcome benefits our residents."

Caterham resident, Tandridge District Councillor and member of the Soper Hall Group. Michael Cooper said: "TDC has £80,000 which should have been spent on the maintenance of the Soper Hall, but the council has spent none of it on the building. They have allowed it to get dilapidated and spent nothing on advertising its facilities for at least two years, which is why it is

so difficult to hire out." Graham Tapley added: "We backed up our bid with a comprehensive and detailed 91 page business plan which we worked exceptionally hard to produce, within a very tight timescale set by the Council in mid-October, and delivered by mid December. We believe the report complied with all that was required by the Council including internal building work, potential new uses and users, cash flow, management and funding sources.

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"As it was a closed committee meeting, held in secret, and with a County Councillor and District Councillor asked to leave the chamber, we do not know what further information is required, but undoubtedly strong community support is a major factor in seizing this unique opportunity of getting a truly vibrant community centre for use, by all. The reason for such secrecy on a matter of great local public and community interest is baffling."

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
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Support the Rotary 'Focus on the Crocus' campaign and help to end polio now!

Polio was completely eradicated from the UK and Europe nine years ago, thanks to Rotary. However the disease still exists in 10% of the world – Nigeria, Afghanistan, India and Pakistan. With your support, we can completely wipe out this crippling disease across the globe.

Focus on the Crocus

This year the campaign - Focus on the Crocus - which is part of the largest worldwide public health campaign in history, continues at pace! In October, Rotarians and young people from 20 schools planted 20,000 purple flowering crocus bulbs supplied to Rotary by Knights Garden Centre. Very soon the crocuses will start to pop their heads through the soil in Queens Park, local schools, The Village, The Dene Hospital, Church Hill and Town End.

The Queen's Park Crocus Maze

In Queen's Park 7,000 bulbs were planted in the form of a maze which will be flowering for many years to come. The design of the maze which has over 100 sections was carried out in conjunction with pupils from de Stafford School who had an active role last year in raising funds towards seeing the end to polio. The sections of the Queen's Park Crocus Maze are now being offered for founder sponsorship at £15 or more and available for the first 100 persons to apply. Our target is £1,500 and again with support from the Gates Foundation this total will mean we can save 75,000 young children overseas from the crippling effects of polio. The names of all the founder sponsors will be included on a special plaque to be erected in Queens Park.

Will the drains take the strain?

Concerns expressed over proposed new development in Caterham-on-the-Hill.

On Wednesday 12th and Saturday 15th January, Surrey and Borders Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (SABP) and Langham Homes held a Public Engagement to discuss the future redevelopment of the former land and buildings at the Oaklands site on Coulsdon Road, Caterham.

Over 170 visitors, including local councillors, attended over the course of the two days when they had the opportunity to put their questions to SABP and Langham Homes.

160 properties consisting of

affordable housing and family homes are proposed for the site, alongside the retention of some of the existing social care homes for people with learning disabilities.

One of the main concerns expressed by local residents was that the local infrastructure such as the roads, schools and old sewerage system could not cope with the demands of another large development. In a statement made follow-

ing the Public Engagement,

Langham Homes Director, Martin Redman, said: "We have been able to hear local residents' concerns in respect of the potential effect on local schools and healthcare facilities. Through Section 106 contributions we will be giving a sum of money to Surrey County Council (SCC) in order to fund any new facilities needed. It is SCC's responsibility to decide where the money is spent."

During the Public Engagement, a local resident pointed out that the antiquated sewerage and drainage system is at bursting point and the town had an old electrical system. He said: "The community is cynical and sceptical about promises of new infrastructure because we have been let down by the council in the past."

Surrey County Councillor and Parish Councillor for Caterham-on-the-Hill, John Orrick, said: "Through Section 106 a considerable sum is likely to accrue for SCC to spend on the infrastructure. We need to decide the best place to spend it. Some of the money will most likely go to schools to create new

places and there could be improvements to road junctions. These would be real improvements. Inevitably there will be re-development but it has to fit in with the requirements of the community and the new residents. One of the things that is a plus is that they have planned to keep the outside the same so people won't see that it is a housing development. So long as the density of the housing is right and we have the benefits to the community that is what will be acceptable."

On the subject of density, Mr Redman stated: "We advised residents that we would be proposing lower densities than the neighbouring sites, reflecting the transition to the greenbelt." To read Mr Redman's full statement regarding the proposed development go to www.caterham-independent.co.uk

Concerned residents voiced their opinions regarding the proposed changes to local bus services at a meeting held at Caterham-on-the-Hill Library on Saturday 15th January. Surrey County Councillor John Orrick and Tandridge District Councillor Chris Botten, both members of Caterham-on-the-Hill Parish Council, outlined the proposed changes which include cutbacks to the 409 Godstone and between Chelsham and the withdrawal of the 540 bus from Caterham to East Surrey Hospital. The changes are part of Surrey County Council's review of the bus service to save money by cutting back on less popular routes. Cllr. John Orrick said: "This is another assault on the least advantaged in the commu-

nity. The buses are vital for people who can't drive and cutting bus services will cause them to become isolated."

Local resident Mrs Revnolds said: "For teenagers the buses are the only way to get around and go to school. What will my children do if the bus routes are abolished?"

The final decision on these proposed changes will be made at the end of March. 

The East Wing now comprises three new flats and six refurbished flats as well as replacement central heating boilers for the whole building. Trustee of Le Personne Homes, John Rawlings, said: "I would like to thank Rob Richards for masterminding getting the funding
