Muslim peace campaign to visit Chaldon

An exhibition of Islam is being held in Chaldon on Saturday 2nd July as part of a nationwide campaign organised by one of Britain's oldest Muslim communities, the Ahmadiyya Muslim Association (AMA). The aim of the campaign is to drive home the message of peace and counter extremists who hijack the faith for political ends.

Dr. Maqbool Sethi of the AMA said: "We want to promote the true meaning of Islam both as a religion and culture to the general public through various awareness programmes. The AMA condemns all forms of terrorism and totally disagrees with the violent response of some Muslims to various recent events." Hundreds of 'Peace Buses'

have been travelling across the UK with banners asserting



the essence of Muslim belief - 'Love for All, Hatred for None'.

The exhibition and informal get-together in Chaldon Village Hall is part of the nationwide awareness programme. From 10.30am-4.30pm there will be a display of books, leaflets and posters on Islam and the AMA, including topical issues such as women in Islam. Refreshments will be available.

Tandridge District Council is delighted Surrey County Council has decided not to introduce on-street pay and display to the district. This follows the district council's strong objection to the proposals, supported by MP Sam Gyimah, local traders and residents. Earlier this year, Tandridge District Council passed a motion to oppose the proposals by Surrey County Council to introduce parking charges on the district's roads. The motion was unanimously agreed by all councillors.

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Surrey County Council has decided not to introduce on-street pay and display, but will review commuter parking in the area. A public consultation will be carried out later this year.

Leader of Tandridge District Council, Councillor Gordon Keymer, said: "We are pleased Surrey has listened to the community and to the council and realised that pay and display would not work in this area, particularly as our own car parks are free. The district led the wave of opposition across the county to these proposals and this is an excellent example of the council, MP. local traders and residents pulling together on an issue of great local importance."

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Girl Guides lose camping equipment in burglary

1st Chaldon Guides have been counting the cost of a break-in to their equipment shed when thieves stole items valued at approximately £3,500. The thieves visited the premises twice, first during the night of Saturday 11th June when they broke into the hut by using bolt-cutters to break the lock. Nothing was taken, but the contents were disturbed and the shed left in On discovering disarray. the break-in on Sunday, the mess was cleaned up by the Guide Leaders and Guides and the lock replaced, only for the thieves to return the following night to steal valuable equipment.

Anne-Marie Smith has been the Guider in Charge at the Unit for the last ten years and is devastated at the theft after all the fundraising her girls have done to purchase the camping and cooking equipment.

Helen Curran, District Commissioner for Caterham and Chaldon Guides said: 'The shed is where the Guides keep their tents, camping equipment and outdoor play things and the thieves took anything of any value at all, especially metal things like the marquee poles and pots and pans. The thieves stole our cooking tent and first aid tent and without the poles, our marquee is useless. It will cost £1,500 to replace. "The contents of the shed was insured but some of the equipment, like the ash buckets for putting out fires, date back over 50 years and are irreplaceable because of their sentimental value. The Chaldon Guides are one of the most active groups in the district - they are always out in the community raising money by bag-packing in supermarkets, for example, to raise money for their summer camp. Luckily, thanks to the kindness of other Guide and Scout groups lending us their equipment, we can still go and enjoy the camp."



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

Diary of a Plantaholic

Runner-up in the BBC Gardener's World competition finals, Sue Baines, has been opening her beautiful Caterham garden to the public during the Caterham Festival for the last two years.

Sue will be sharing her thoughts and expertise with us each month in her new column.

As I write, it is raining buckets and quite windy too. I try to prioritise my jobs according to the weather. One of my jobs this week has been to tie in any large plants. They do have a chickenwire cage put over them in early spring, but always need a bit more support. I cut the grass, which since the garden opening, has been growing madly as have all the hedges. The grass still looks very patchy though, so in places it has had grass seed sown. It has also had a liquid feed of Evergreen, which greens it up very quickly. It lasts for six weeks and fits on the end of a hose. I dig the weeds up, rather than using the Weed and Feed, which always seems a bit hit and miss. Although said to be

In the morning, or after heavy rain I take a cane round and gently shake the plants to rid them of the water. However, if it is raining a lot, then I deadhead as much as possible, so that the next batch of flowers start forming as soon as the next sunny spell arrives. Another job this week has been to nematode the (hopefully) whole garden. I used the Miracle Grow feeder, but it will be several weeks yet before they become effective. This is to eradicate vine weevil which I have dissapointingly found three of already. They eat notches in the leaves and can lay up to 800 eggs at a time, which turn into fat white grubs, which are partial to anything of a succulent nature, such as begonia, heuchera and aeonium. Laurel, bay and eleagnus all seem to be on the menu, too. So, if a plant is just not thriving, and is surrounded by shrubs with lots of notches then check the soil. Provado is another good and quick option if only a few plants are affected, but rather





Housing development in Caterham

I would like to take issue with several statements made in a letter from Mr. Bob Evans last month in connection with housing developments on the Hill.

Mr. Nigel Greenhalgh has rightly commented that Caterham has taken the lion's share of development and that Oxted has got off lightly. This is particularly true of the Hill.

In response, Mr. Evans comments that Caterham has had the closure of St. Lawrence's Hospital and two defence installations have become redundant (Caterham Barracks and Kenley Aerodrome). This is precisely why Caterham-on the-Hill has taken more development than other more southerly parts of Tandridge. Mr. Evans refers to develop-

ment-related gains including road improvements. Any improvements have only been to those roads built to service new developments on the Hill. There have been no significant improvements to the Hill's highways. Indeed, major roads such as Whyteleafe Road, Buxton Lane, Coulsdon Road and Ninehams Road are deteriorating in part due to new developments that have simply increased the amount of traffic that they carry.

There is also mention by Mr. Evans of a development gain in the shape of new shops. There has been only one major new shop, in recent years, Tesco. Mr. Evans refers to school

improvements. I have lived improvements. I have lived on the Hill since 1983 and can think of no significant new developments at schools on the Hill. The only major change has been the loss of de Stafford School's sixth form – hardly an improvement and I understand that de Stafford is now oversubscribed. Despite the huge increase in

incomers to the Hill the area is still served by the same number of medical practices.

As for the gain of 'large areas of open space', the only new open space on the Hill is the cricket square by Tesco.

Mr. Evans says that releasing Green Belt land in Oxted in order to balance development in Caterham would set one community against another. He is clearly totally ignorant of the huge level of resentment on the Hill over the amount of infilling which has been pushed through during his time as Head of Planning at Tandridge District Council.

The character of the Hill has been changed by planning applications approved under Mr Evans' regime. For example, in the immediate area bordered by Whyteleafe Road and Salmons Lane West, there used to be just five houses. Very soon there will be 21 houses with the concomitant increase in traffic, and the loss of back garden wildlife habitat and a network of badgers' setts. I agree with Marc Hansen when he questions why Oxted's 'nimbys', aided and abetted by Oxted-based councillors, continue to hold Caterham to ransom by forcing increasing development onto the area without creation of the necessary additional infrastructure.

It is hoped that Mr. Evans' successor will be more aware of the effect of planning decisions on Caterham-on-the-Hill and will accept that the area has taken more than its fair share of new housing. *Peter Brent, Caterham.*
