On Monday 13th May, Terry Waite CBE visited the former Caterham Barracks in Caterham-onthe-Hill to retread the steps he took as a young soldier 53 years ago. The trip was a fact finding mission to establish what help and support Terry could provide to the Caterham Barracks Trust to address some of the challenges it faces at the present time. He visited the Chapel, The Officers' Mess, the Barracks Blocks, the Quartermasters Store and the Gyms (now the ARC). The trip

clearly brought back memories which he offered freely to a small group including Robin Clements, Chair of the Trust, Dick Moran, Chief Executive of the Trust, Beth Wood from the ARC and researcher Matt Johnson.

Several initiatives were suggested to him and by him which will be picked up by the Trust and the ARC. He indicated that he would like to be involved with the work being done by the Trust and the ARC and promised to come

back to contribute to a programme called 'Aspire' which is to be launched by the ARC in the autumn.

Following the visit, Dick Moran said: "Terry Waite is one of the most charming people I have ever met. Before he left he told me that while he was in captivity in the Lebanon he folded his trousers every night and put them under his mattress so they were pressed for morning something he learned during his time at Caterham Barracks. He said that it helped him to retain his sense of human dignity."

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




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Could Caterham become a **'Business Improvement District'?**

On Wednesday 15th May a public meeting took place at the Soper Hall in Caterham Valley to discuss the possibility of Caterham becoming a Business Improvement District ('BID').

Since September 2004 the BIDs legislation has enabled businesses in England and Wales to develop their own area improvement plans.

If Caterham businesses decide to go ahead with a BID it would be funded by a levy paid by local businesses, based on their rateable value. The Chief Executive of Tandridge District Council, Louise Round, was in attendance to hear about how a BID could potentially help with the economic development of the district. Keith Hoskins the Town Centre Manager for Hitchin and Matthew Sims, the Chief Executive of the Croydon BID also attended to talk about how the BID works in their two very different towns.

Andrew Browne, the owner of JJ Browne Jewellers, chaired the meeting and before introducing the speakers he said: "If Caterham becomes a BID town it could help to expand schemes such as the Shop Local and Shop Watch schemes and other initiatives to improve both the Valley and the Hill.'

During his presentation, Keith Hoskins explained how the Hitchin BID enabled the town to get a market, build a car park in an undeveloped site and take over their town

Speaking about the Croydon BID. Matthew Sims told the audience that Croydon's BID levy raises over £1m because it is such a large town so they have addressed a number of issues such as 'Perception and Image'. 'Crime and Security' and 'Festivals and Events'.

The next stage in the process will be to conduct a survey to see if there is enough local support for the creation of a BID

Council fails to consult community on New Homes **Bonus grant**

Members of Caterham Valley Parish Council ('CVPC')are demanding that Tandridge District Council ('TDC') consult with the local community over how to spend the revenue raised through the government's New Homes Bonus scheme. The Bonus is a grant paid by central government to local councils for increasing the number of homes, based on the amount of extra Council Tax Revenue raised. In 2012 the amount raised through new homes built in Caterham totalled £202,000.00 while the amount for the rest of Tandridge amounted £32,422.00.

CVPC Chairman, Michael Lincoln said: "It seems that TDC has applied all the bonus money to a general fund for the benefit of the whole of Tandridge. This is hardly fair when those parishes to the south of the M25 have not suffered from the same level of development but are still benefiting from funds generated from the new homes

In a statement, Louise Round, Chief Executive of TDC said: "Tandridge District Council has agreed a policy to use the money from the New Homes Bonus to maintain and support revenue service provision throughout the Council, which helps reduce the level of annual savings required to be found, or to finance the capital programme. This has helped us not increase Council Tax for the third year running.

"The money from the New Homes Bonus scheme does not belong to a particular area of the district, but is allocated to the District Council to decide how it should be spent."

The Parish Council referred the matter to the Housing Minister, Mark Prisk MP and the reply stated: "The Government expects local authorities to engage with their local community to decide how the money is spent, so that residents feel the direct benefits growth."

Cllr. Lincoln said: "This is clearly not the case as there has been no approach from TDC asking where we wish to invest this grant".













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Rose & Young site owner fined

At Redhill Magistrates Court on Monday 13th May, the owner of the former Rose & Young site in Croydon Road, Caterham, Caterham Properties Ltd, was found guilty, in its absence, of failure to comply with a planning enforcement notice. The Court imposed the maximum fine of £1,000, awarded the Council costs of £796 and £15 to the victim support fund.
Tandridge District Council's Planning Commit-

tee has agreed to prosecute the owner again if the requirements of the notice are not carried out within six weeks of this conviction. A second conviction has a maximum fine of £100 \pm 100 \pm 10 \pm 100 \pm

ond conviction has a maximum fine of £100 for every day the notice is not complied with, following the first conviction. In September 2012, following a decision by the Council's Planning Committee, a legal notice was served on the owner requiring significant improvements to the appearance of the building, or for the building to be demolished. The period for compliance with the notice passed and in March the Planning Committee decided

to pursue prosecution of the owner for failure to comply with the requirements of the notice. Tandridge District Council has said that it does have powers to carry out the required works itself, but has de-cided, before spending significant public money on a matter that is the responsibility of the land owner, to bring a series of prosecu-tions. The Council said that it is continuing to press the owner to take action to resolve the ap-pearance of the building and to

bring forward plans for redevelopment of the

Gill Black, Chairman of the Planning Committee, said: "This successful prosecution, in the absence of the owner, shows the Council will not tolerate land owners who let their properties become dilapidated by neglect. Unsightly properties have a detrimental impact on the appearance of an area. In this case the Council remains intent on pressing the land owner to take responsibility for the building.'

The privately owned site has been unoccupied for many years and the Council, residents and businesses are unhappy with the run down appearance of the land and building. The Council has previously issued a policy statement about the potential for pursuing compulsory purchase and says that redevelopment of the site remains one of its key objectives.

Following the court hearing, Caterham resident John Harvey said: "This is a welcome move towards the day when direct action will have to be taken either by the owners of the site or by Tandridge District Council."

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

Diary of a **Plantaholic**

by Sue Baines

The yo-yo season continues. April showers and some very warm days have at last awoken plants from a long winter dormancy. One of my crucial jobs is to support all the larger perennials, with home-made chicken wire cages, which we have made into three different sizes. These work really well. Before supporting, a lot of the more rampant plants have been divided, with just the best bits being kept.

The pond is also coming to life. Water lily, aponogeton with its elongated leaves and white flowers, bulrushes (miniature), and the gorgeous blue and white iris, are all showing new growth. It is just a matter of time before the dreaded blanket weed makes an appearance, choking everything in its path. To combat this I use barley straw. It takes a while to get going, but works quite well, and lasts for about six months. We use three small netted bales. I left Geoff to do the maths!

The runner bean plants are a few inches tall. These were soaked overnight in mid-April, and then put, with a few handfuls of damp, multi purpose soil, in a small clear bag which I hung up in a frost free greenhouse (because there was no room on the benches!). As they sprouted, I moved them into troughs, and will put them into the ground once frost is no longer a threat. I will make several sowings as the fox usually digs quite a few

The grass has had another good raking, been cut a few times, and fed. I prefer to use a liquid feed that is attached to a hose. With the edges trimmed, the garden is starting to look good at

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

Leafe ended the season in a disappointing sixth place in the Hurlimann Kent Premier League.


