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New Rose & Young Task and Finish Group presents its findings to Tandridge planning officers

On Tuesday, 8th April the new Rose and Young Task and Finish Group at Tandridge District Council presented its Report to the council's Planning Policy Committee. The comprehensive Report contains the Group's recommendations about how to bring about the redevelopment of the old Mercedes car showroom in Croydon Road, Caterham, that has been derelict for over 18 years. The Report had been put together after reviewing progress to date and meeting with other interested parties.

After discussing the content of the Report, the Committee voted unanimously to adopt its recommendations, which includes releasing up to £50,000 from the Economic

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The old Rose & Young site. Development Reserve. The money will be available to fund site investigations and provide details of a viable redevelopment scheme for the site. It will also be used for seeking advice from experts with regard to using Compulsory Purchase powers if the owner of the site refuses to engage in the redevelopment process. Another of the recommendations in the Report was that the council continues to support the CR3 Forum Neighbourhood Plan, including supporting the proposal for a Neighbourhood Development Order ('NDO') for the Rose and Young site. Following the meeting, a spokesperson for the CR3 Forum said: "TDC have recognised the potential power of the Neighbourhood Plan for the CR3 area, By working in partnership with us, the long hoped-for project to see the site redeveloped is less risky financially and

legally for the Council now than it was without us. This is a boost for the CR3 Forum, the Neighbourhood Plan and for Caterham as a whole".

Local resident, John Harvey, who has extensive experience of Compulsory Purchase Orders, was less convinced that an NDO would help to bring about redevelopment of the site. saying: "I regard the Task and Finish Group's enthusiasm for obtaining planning permission by an NDO as misplaced. This is a longwinded process that could be the long grass where future necessary decisions are kicked. It is also new and untried and its uncertainties could discourage a development partner."

In response, the Chairman of the Rose and Young Task and Finish Group, Cllr. Jane Ingham, said: "It is the intention of the Rose and Young Task and Finish Group to explore different options to secure our goal with regards to the site. This is to establish an outline plan which will research partnership options in order to achieve an appropriate development of the site - the obtaining of an NDO is just one aspect of the work and will not preclude us from pursuing other options.

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Marc Hansen, one of the local businessmen who have been trying to help find a way to get the site redeveloped in recent years, was also present at the Planning Policy Committee meeting. After the meeting he said: "It was gratifying to witness the positive manner in which the proposed action was discussed at the meeting. Whilst some reservations were expressed by certain councillors, the overall view in the room was that progress must now be made towards reaching a satisfactory outcome to this long-standing blight on Caterham Valley."

Jill Bonsall, who is the Chairman of the Caterham and District Local History Centre and also Chairman of The Bourne Society local history group, was the guest speaker at the Caterham-on-the-Hill Parish Council AGM on Wednesday 16th April.

Jill spoke to the audience about the project being undertaken to move the St. Lawrence's Hospital First World War Memorial from its current spot in St. Mary's Church yard, to inside the church to protect it from further damage from the elements. The memorial was saved when the hospital was demolished in the 1990s. The location of the World War II memorial is not known, so funds will also be needed to replace the memorial if the original cannot be found. The whole project will cost in the region of £3,500 and it is hoped to raise the funds needed and install the memorials inside the church in time for the Remembrance Day service in November.

The meeting also saw the presentation of the council's Good Citizen Award to local farmer Nick Dance, for all the kind assistance he has given to the council such as assisting with tree planting and other maintenance projects.

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The bells of St. Mary's ring out in celebration

On 29th and 30th March, St. Mary's Church in Caterham celebrated a landmark in its history. It was the 20th anniversary of the church bells first calling worshippers to church on Mothering Sunday, 1994, the culmination of an 18 month project to install a 'ring of eight'. Six of the bells came from All Saints Church, Hamer in Greater Manchester, where the bells had been sold to raise money for the church after an arson attack and then donated to St Mary's by the Surrey Association of Church Bell Ringers. The other two bells, cast at Whitechapel Bell Foundry, were donated by parishioners to make up the current ring.

It had been a Community Project involving a teacher and students from Warlingham School, members of



the St. Mary's congregation, the Army who were then still at Caterham Barracks, bell ringers from other local churches, and many other people who supplied labour and specialised expertise to complete the installation. At the time it was estimated that £80,000 was saved by donations and the use of the volunteer labour and expertise in today's money £150,000 adjusting for inflation.

So on the afternoon of 29th March 2014, the day before Mothering Sunday, a wonderful celebration took place at St. Mary's. Many people who had been involved with the installation 20 years ago and ringers

who have rung with us over the years had been invited. 80 people gathered in St. Mary's Hall for a 'ringers' tea' and to listen to a celebratory half peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major which took one hour 29 minutes and was conducted by our Ringing Master, Ross Weddell, who was only three when the bells were installed! There was also a display of photos of the installation and much reminiscing took place.

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
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Talented de Stafford drama students perform 'The Wiz'





Diary of a **Plantaholic**

There hasn't been too much time to 'stand and stare' this year, which is a shame as it has been a beautiful spring, and seems to be shaping up for a promising summer (she says tentatively!)

This is the time of year when I lose a lot of weight, as whatever tools I need always seem to be at the opposite end of the garden. I must get more organised and use my trug!

Spring brings sun and rain and the plants grow at a terrific pace. Therefore plant supports become a priority. We use chicken wire and netting, some of which is quite heavy duty. I have put some large pots in the middle of the beds. These are for plants like Dahlias and half hardy plants which still need protection from frost until the end of May. I need to position them in the beds before then, as walking through the beds once they are fully grown is very damaging.

I have started my hanging

baskets, using cuttings of 'basket Fuschias' around the sides along with home grown Anagalis, Nemesia 'shooting stars' (free seeds not tried before), Yellow Helichrysum and Trailing Lobelia. At the top are upright Fuschias, Pink Geraniums, and Pink New Guinea hybrids, Isotoma, with its pale blue starry flowers and a little more trailing Lobelia. These, and lots more, are available at garden centres. Choice is best early on, but they must be kept frost-free and in good light. The same goes for tomatoes which can also do really well in a basket.

This year I am growing Maskotka for friends and family. I have added longlife food but additional feeds Tomorite should keep them cropping through to the Autumn, as long as they don't dry out.

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

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Nature Notes

Mr Badger is not here. As a child, he was a favourite character in the Wind in the Willows and The Animals of Farthing Wood, but tonight the story is stolen by his real cousins - social, lively and hungry. In the torchlight, I can see that the fox scavenging scraps under the birdfeeder is wary; her eyes darken, her ears flatten and she steals away. A big fox weighs 4kg, and a big badger 14kg, and while they often tolerate each other, there is a hierarchy, with the badger firmly on top. One badger becomes six, and the peanuts vanish.

Britain boasts more badgers than foxes, yet many people will never alimpse one. Any woodland walk will yield evidence of their lives: broad tracks with five toes and a kidney-shaped heel pad, communal latrines serving as territory boundary markers, beaten trails patrolled by the dominant boars. Sometimes, too, there are shallow diggings of earthworms, their favourite prey – and a reminder that if badgers share our country, they also share our

discomfort at endless rain. It drowns their earthworms and can even cause their setts to collapse. I have footage of a sow badger furiously digging a tiny cub out of a crumbled chamber.

And unlike Mr Badger, they are social, and not only to each other. Wood mice and rabbits lodge within setts, and foxes often breed there too - some compensation for the rivalry over the peanuts.

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
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Eating Out

Try something spicy and new at Fushia

The award-winning Fushia restaurant in South Croydon offers an extensive choice of dishes from different regions and is a great place to visit if you would like to discover an exciting new dish.

When I visited with my friend Mike, he was recommended the squid for starter and I was pleasantly surprised to be spoilt for choice, being a vegetarian. The owner of Fushia, Srini, recommended I have the Vegetarian Chilli Chicken for my starter. I was a bit confused at first, wondering how something with 'chicken' in its name can be vegatarian, but it turned out to be a delicious starter with a sova curd substitute providing the same texture as chicken. Green chillis, spring onion and garlic ensured the Vegetarian Chicken had a real kick to it! Mike said that his squid, a Malaysian dish, was 'unbelieve-

able' - not chewy, but with a

lovely crispy batter that retained its crispiness without going soggy.

Srini then served us Sri Lankan 'Hoppas', bowl-shaped crispy pancakes with an accompaniment of intensely-flavoured onion chutney and dessicated coconut. This was a first for both of us, a tasty dish that was lovely to eat with our fingers! The Hoppas were followed by a new speciality that has been introduced at Fushia - Masala Dosas, a dish that Srini is especially proud of. The Dosas are from Southern India, and neither of us had seen anything like them anywhere before. Shaped like an enormous pancake roll, the Dosas had a gorgeous Masala filling of lightly cooked potatoes, onions, green chilli and spices, so it is soft on the inside and crunchy on the outside. The Dosas came with 'Sambar' (vegetables with lentils) and coconut chutney. Apart from the wonderful food.

there were two things that especially impressed us. First was the huge range of dishes to choose from, that even included a whole, separate selection of Vegetarian Starters. Secondly, we were able to watch the chefs cooking the food through a huge glass window!

The service was very friendly


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
