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Popular youth leader leaves 'Street'



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Celebrations mark 70th Anniversary of **VE Day**

On Saturday 9th May a group of nine bellringers from St. John's and St. Mary's churches in Caterham and two nonringers met at 11am to ring and listen to the bells of St. John's. The Rt. Hon. William Hague had requested on behalf of the government that bells be rung across the country over the anniversary weekend to commemorate the 70th Anniversary of VE Day.

The Caterham group included five gentlemen old enough to remember VE Day on 8th May 1945.

Cupcakes decorated with the Union Flag were enjoyed by all, while the 'old gentlemen' spoke of their own memories of VE Day in 1945.

The previous day, Friday 8th May, First Community Health and Care held a VE Day Anniversary celebration for patients on the ward at Caterham Dene Hospital. Members of East Surrey Museum brought along some wartime memorabilia and some of the items were familiar to patients who through the Second lived World War.

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Diary of a Plantaholic

This is always the busiest time of year for me, as I have my , Open' `Garden on 13th/14thJune.

Most large plants were put out at the beginning of May to harden off. I check the long range weather forecast for the next ten days, as an abun-dance of wind, rain or sun will change my priorities, and will change what is going to be in flower that weekend. No two years are quite the same.

The dahlias have filled their pots and need to go into their final positions. They are my stalwart plant, as they flower so reliably right through until late autumn. I love them. They are easy to maintain, but do need regular feeds of tomato fertiliser every couple of weeks. They need strong support, as some get very large. They are obviously loved by slugs, snails and in later months earwigs, which can be very damaging, so I'm always vigilant. Greenfly can be a problem on all new, soft growth, not just on dahlias. If infestations continue, it could be a sign that

plants are in too shady a place. Emptying my compost bins has given me a nice laver of mulch, which in the short term has smothered lots of the small emerging weeds. Even though it is 'cold' compost it still builds up the soil structure each year, leaving a crumbly friable soil, that is so easy to work.

The ponds have had little attention so far, although Geoff has now put the barley straw in. We find this does considerably reduce the blanket weed. Concentrated liquid barley straw is more immediate, but we have not used it yet. The straw takes about a month before it is effective.

I hope to see some of you at my 'Garden Open' at 116 Burntwood Lane, Caterham between 2pm-6pm on 13th/14th June. Entrance is £4, for the Caterham Dene League of Friends.

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
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

Get ready for the **Caterham Rotary Half Marathon** and 10k

The second Caterham Rotary Half Marathon and first 10k, both again sponsored by North Downs Hospital, Caterham, will start on Redhill Aerodrome at 9am on Sunday 26th July. Last year over 150 runners completed the Half Marathon with the winner, Matt Collins, claiming the £100 cash prize and coming home in one hour 20 minutes and 48 seconds. The last to finish took well over twice that time, so this event is open to both experienced runners as well as 'new' runners.

The Half Marathon distance consists of two circuits of the roads surrounding Redhill Aerodrome, including the village of Nutfield, with the 10k route taking one circuit. Both routes are certified so that the event is UK Athletics approved and times count towards athletes who wish to include the event for their national performance records.

New Play Area for Timber Hill, Caterham



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Runners take on Marathon challenge to support their causes

On Sunday 26th April, thousands of people took part in the Virgin London Marathon, raising money for numerous good causes in the process. On this page we are featuring just a few of the many local people who took part in the event.

30 year-old ex-soldier, Ben Goodlad from Coulsdon, chose to run the Marathon for Blind Veterans UK as a way of honouring the bravery of his grandfather who fought in the Second World War and his comrades he served with in Iraq.

Ben, who completed the Marathon in six hours and 19 minutes, said: "If I had heard that time before I started I would have been disappointed but just finishing is a huge achievement. Crossing the finish was incredible and pretty emotional because you put so much physical and mental effort into getting there."

Ben so far has raised £1,300

and aims to raise a total of £2,000 for Blind Veterans UK. To make a donation visit www.justgiving.com/Ben-Goodlad.

A family from Whyteleafe have been raising money for Shooting Star Chase Hospice since their daughter Elsie Violet Poole passed away two years ago. The hospice cared for Elsie who died aged just 21 months, following her courageous battle with the epileptic condition West Syndrome. The team of six family and friends have so far raised £10,000 between them by running the Marathon.

Spokesperson for Team Elsie, Gemma Causbrook, said: "Our original goal when we started fundraising after Elsie died was £23,000, which is how much it costs the hospice a day to keep running, but due to everyone's overwhelming generosity and support, we have raised over £62,000 by holding fundraising events and doing things like the London to Brighton Bike Ride and now the London Marathon."

Caterham, ran the London Marathon just four years after a stem cell transplant that saved his life. Toby was diagnosed with Hodgkins Lym-phoma in September 2010 but luckily Toby was able to use his own stem cells instead of relying on a stranger willing to donate their stem cells. Toby was told about the Anthony Nolan register and what they do to help find suitable donors for other patients. Four years later and back to full fitness, Toby decided to run the London Marathon to raise money for Anthony Nolan to help them recruit more potential bone marrow donors to the register.

After completing the Marathon, Toby said: "I wanted to complete the Marathon in under four hours but unfortunately I got cramp early on so I did not manage to do that, but I did it in four hours 16 minutes. It was incredible. Every time I got tired the crowd cheered me on and when you get to the end you know all the pain was completely worth it!"

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Eating Out Dewan-E-Am Fine Indian Restaurant in Caterham-onthe-Hill

At 188 Coulsdon Road, Caterham-on-the-Hill (just past Tesco) there is a stylish Indian restaurant, Dewan-E-Am, which translates as 'dining room of royalty'. I dined there recently with my friend Anne, a real fan of Indian food, who had not been to Dewan-E-Am before. She straight away commented on how pleasantly surprised she was by the contemporary decor, as she was expecting it to be more traditional.

We were served some nice crispy papadams soon after we were seated with a selection of relishes, to whet our appetite as we browsed the menu. The service continued to be excellent throughout the evening.

When we ordered our food Anne asked Sam, the owner, for his recommendation for her main course as she fancied a sweet chicken dish, maybe cooked with something like mango. Sam recommended the Chicken Kashmir, a sweet and spicy dish, while I ordered the Vegetable Dansak, a dish consisting of vegetables and lentils, from the Dansak and Pathia selection on the menu. Anne had Onion Bhaji for her starter and I chose Vegetable Samosa. The starters were just right, not

too stodgy and filling, and crispy without being oily, and beautifully presented.

When the main courses arrived, the chef had added mango to Anne's Chicken Kashmir especially for her, much to her delight. My Vegetable Dansak was very tasty, with beans, courgettes, broccoli, carrots and other vegetables combined with the lentils making a very flavoursome dish. I was assured that all the vegetables were freshly prepared, not frozen.

To go with our mains we shared a creamy Saag Paneer (cheesy spinach) and Coconut Rice and the quantity of food turned out to be just right.

Sam has recently introduced 'Buy one main course, get one free' on Monday evenings, dine in only, which is a great way to start the week!

They also have a Banquet Night every Wednesday, costing £12.95 per person.

Reading the account of the recent WWI Recruitment Day Commemoration in the May edition of The Caterham Independent prompted me to tell readers about my father, Richard John Craker, who was a Sergeant Major in the First World War. He met with one of his brothers at the Battle of the Somme, where he survived but his brother died.

He was injured at another battle. The bullet went straight across his head and he had the scar until he died in his seventies.

When he recovered he went back to Egypt to proect the Suez Canal and carried on in the war. He got more battle scars but he came back to his home in London and in the Second World War he drove the local fire engine around Caterham as he could not re-enlist, much to his disgust!

He married in Caterham and settled down here, becoming an officer in the local Sea Cadets.


