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Kenley remembers 'The Hardest Day'by James Highsted

On Sunday, 16th August, a crowd of over 2,000 people flocked to Kenley Airfield to commemorate the 75th aniversary of 'The Hardest Day' during the Battle of Britain.

The Battle of Britain Memorial Flight - a Spitfire Mk LF IXe and Hurricane Mk Ilc, made a full display to remember the fateful day that saw the biggest loss of British and German aircraft during the battle on 18th August 1940. The display was sponsored by the Kenley Airfield Friends Group.

Organiser of the display, Mike Street, was delighted with how the day went and how all the hard work was rewarded with a great display.

Mike said: "I thought the day was extremely good and everything went well. It was a busy day, but the sight of the aircraft made it all very worthwhile."

The display coincided with Kenley Heritage Day at the Portcullis Club field which saw guided walks take place with a mini-aircraft display, classic cars, barbecue and live band. Alan Morgan, Chairman of Kenley Airfield Friends Group who organised the Heritage Day, said: "The day was a tremendous success which exceeded our expectations. It was great to see so many people attending to commemorate such an important day and remember all those brave young pilots who lost their lives during the Battle of Britain."

The Hardest Day was marked again on Tuesday 18th August with a flypast of eight Spitfires and Hurricanes over Kenley Airfield and formations over other bases in the South-East.

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Caterham residents asked to sign petition to 'Save Our Playground'

Residents living on the old Caterham Barracks site in Caterham-on-the-Hill are signing a petition to urge local agencies to fund a complete refurbishment of their dangerously dilapidated playground. The residents are angry that in recent years the playground has fallen into ruin with rotten fences, broken swings, splintered see-saws and torn floooring presenting a danger to children and an eyesore in the centre of the community.

One of the residents, Caroline Warner, who started the petition, said: "Response to the petition has been fantastic and so far we have over 150 signatures on and offline for Save Our Playground. I hope to get 500 names before I present our petition to the Parish Council at the meeting on Wednesday 9th September. We want to see the Parish Council, Caterham Barracks Community Trust ('CBCT') and the Residents' Associaiton working together to fund a complete refurbishment

of our playground." Comments about the playground left on the online petition include:

"The state of this playground is shameful";

"This lovely playgrond has been in disrepair for a very long time":

I am very concerned that a child could be hurt due to this nealect".

Another local resident, Paul Pozzoni, expressed concern that CBCT has not spent any money on the playground and other public assets, such as the cricket pavilion, for many years, despite the residents paying CBCT in excess of £250,000 towards maintenance since the development started in 2,000. He said: "CBCT was established in 2,000 and according to its own website was gifted in excess of £2m of property assets and cash. 15 years later, the charity is apparently out of funds to invest in these community facilities. Questions are being asked

about the responsibilities of management and trustees who have allowed this neglect to happen."

In a statement, Dick Moran, Chief Executive of CBCT, said: "The Trust was given buildings through the Section 106 agreement between the Council and Linden Homes but they all needed refurbishment and the cost estimated by Linden was well below the actual cost, so the Trust was forced to borrow money (£600,000) from Linden to complete the first building (the Naafi). Even though it was an interest free loan, the cost of repayment (£30,000) is greater than the money covenanted by residents to the Trust (£26,000) so the Trust has to earn substantial sums from renting premises to pay bills and staff. The Trust has struggled to earn enough to maintain the property it inherited to a reasonable standard. "Both Tandridge District Council and Linden Homes have been invited to meet with the Trust Chair, Jeff Blyth, to discuss how they can help the Trust to continue to provide the high quality services and facilities the

Trust is tasked to deliver and their response is awaited."

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On a more positive note, Caroline added: "Every cloud has a silver lining and the silver lining here is that we have all met more families and made more friends in the last few weeks. Coming together as a community to campaign for the right of our childeren to have a safe and fun place to play has

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forged bonds that wil be strong for a long time to come.'

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

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

With autumn hues becoming more evident, it's time to start preparing for next year! The garden is still lovely, but as I'm cutting back, I'm taking cuttings of my favourite plants, and rescuing others that have not been able to keep up with the competition. There is a lot of mould around in this season, so trying to take out any old foliage, or dead stems not only looks better, but hopefully keeps the plants healthier. There are fungus sprays around, but good hygiene means prevention is better than cure.

Quite a few of the annuals are now setting seed. It's funny how each year is different. This year I have loved how the Phacaelia has done. It is easily available, though not often seen, and has gorgeous gentian blue flowers that give almost two months of colour. So they are top of my list, but Poppies, Nigella (Love in a Mist) Godetia, Californian Poppy, and Clarkia are all worth collecting. I usually

sow some too, as they are the hardy annuals, so will cope with most bad winters, which means they will flower earlier next year. Spring sown seed will flower as the others are slowing down, to give a longer season of interest. They do require a sunny spot, but not overly rich soil.

I always wish I had a bigger vegetable plot at this time of the year! The runner beans (accompanied by black fly throughout their growth) are doing well. The greenhouse has been very productive, lots of tomatoes, cucumbers and chillies have rewarded me for all the tomato feed they have had. Nothing beats the taste of homegrown vegetables.



Who wants to be a Volunteer?

Stroke affects 150,000 people a year in the UK, leaving many with communication difficulties (known as Aphasia). People with Aphasia can think clearly but sometimes have difficulty talking, understanding a conversation, reading, writing or using numbers. This can be very isolating and frustrating.

We recruit volunteers every year for the Aphasia Support Scheme. Volunteers trained and then are matched to a client with Aphasia. Volunteers visit weekly for about an hour to encourage conversation and provide support, initially for a six month period. There is on-going help for the volunteers from the Speech and Language Therapies Unit, who provide the training.

Last year a client who had difficulty speaking and some memory loss after a stroke was introduced to Aphasia volunteer. They have been meeting

regularly ever since. The client said it had been marvellous to have someone to communicate with who understands about having a stroke. The volunteer was equally delighted with the pairing and said: "I was nervous at first, but shouldn't have been because we chat about everything. I get so much from the visits as well".

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Nature Notes

Ten feet from a deer that is going nowhere: a thrashing, kicking creature, its fullgrown antlers enmeshed in the disused wires of what was an electric fence, tying it as securely as a leash on a dog. It had only been trying to leave a field, as deer have done ever since humanity first cut alades into Surrev's wildwood. But modern ways to enforce land ownership have not made life easy for wild animals I have thought a lot about

fences recently, and think some more as volunteers from London Wildcare throw a blanket over the panicking deer and begin cutting it free. Everyone wants privacy and security, me included. But in our zeal to screen out unwelcome people, we sometimes forget that a little kindness can mean a world of difference to our Take wild neighbours. hedgehogs, for example. Their populations are plummeting because habitat is being sliced up by more and more closed-hatch fences.

The best garden in the world is no use if hedgehogs cannot enter it. But all they need is a brick-sized gap at the base. It's so easy.

Not so with deer. But this one at least is saved. The volunteers have unravelled the tangle, and in a blink it is gone - a handsome russet buck on rich summer grass, half-flying with gracious leaps, the safety of the wood beckoning it. I can only hope that the long-term vision for this beautiful part of England doesn't destroy our natural heritage by inadvertently fencing it out.
