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Warlingham residents rally to save popular local garage

A scheme to demolish Manor Park Garage in Westhall Road, Warlingham, and replace it with a block of flats is being strenuously opposed by local residents who do not want to see the closure of their popular local garage.

The planning application submitted to Tandridge District Council by the Trademark Group is for the "Demolition of the garage and erection of a three storey apartment building containing 14 residential units with associated landscaping and car parking for 16 vehicles."

If planning permission is granted, the owners of Manor Park Garage, which has occupied the site for 34 years, will have three months' notice to vacate the premises and reopen for business elsewhere. However, with the loss of so much commercial land in Tandridge in recent years to accommodate residential developments, it is highly unlikely the owners will find anywhere suitable in the area to relocate to.

At a Planning Meeting of Warlingham Parish Council held on Tuesday 10th May,

Warlingham resident, Debbie Miles, expressed her concern about the proposed new development, saying: "I believe the new development will be out of character and not in keeping with the village. Manor Park Garage contributes to the local economy and is an employer of six staff, whose jobs will be lost if the development is approved. It has been proven that the site is not unsatisfactory as a commercial site as businesses have been thriving there for over 60 years."

Warlingham Parish Council have submitted a formal objection to the planning application, details of which will be available to view on their website at www.warlinghampc.org.uk. *Continued on page 4.*

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Council approves scheme for 48 flats on Rose & Young site

On Thursday 28th April, Tandridge District Council's ('TDC's) Planning Committee approved two planning applications for the redevelopment of the Rose & Young site in Croydon Road, Caterham. The first application, submitted by the owner of the site, that has been derelict for 20 years, was for 48 flats on four floors over a ground floor retail unit with basement car park beneath. The second application was for a part-four, part-five storey 107-bedroom Premier Inn hotel with a restaurant and retail unit on the ground floor, and basement car park beneath.

The permission granted for the owner's scheme is subject to the owner signing a Section 106 Agreement that states that if building has not commenced within one year, the Council can re-look at the requirement to include

affordable housing in the scheme. At the time the planning application was submitted, evidence was produced to show that it was not financially viable to include affordable housing. Following the decision to grant planning permission for the owner's scheme, the Chief Planning Officer for Tandridge District Council, Mr Piers Mason, said: "The Council has a duty to consider planning applications made to it. Whatever the owner's motive, the Council appreciates that granting planning permission does not guarantee development will go ahead. Our aim is for the site to be redeveloped.

"Bearing in mind the long history of inaction and the lack of guarantee that a planning permission will be

implemented by the owner, the Council will continue to pursue the compulsory purchase of the site. The Council's partners have the funds and plans in place to deliver the hotel and retail scheme as soon as they can acquire the land."

Caterham Valley Parish Council objected to both planning applications, as they did not consider either scheme to be suitable for Caterham for a number of reasons, including traffic management, parking and the excessive density of the dwellings in the residential scheme.

Chairman of Caterham Valley Parish Council, Cllr. Jenny Gaffney, said: would appear that for something to be financially viable in Caterham, this often means it is to the detriment of Caterham which generally leads to serious overdevelopment of a site.

The government parking standards and TDC's own density policy in their Core Strategy CSP19 were ig-Where nored/dismissed. Caterham is concerned, these always seem to be auidelines with lots of scope for manoeuvre.

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
"The comment has often been made that it is better to have something rather than nothing on the Rose & Young site but both of these options in their current form are overdevelopment of the site and set high density precedents for future development in the town. Both potential developments also ignore the concerns of many local residents who will have to put up with more parking in their already saturated roads."

Summarising the Parish Council's objection, Cllr. David Cooley said: "War-lingham Parish Council is very concerned about the potential loss of a highly regarded business, which is important to the community. We do not want to lose an important employ-ment site nor do we believe that residential property at this location would be of benefit to Warresidential lingham.

In response to the con-cerns expressed by Warlingham Parish Council and the local residents, the Chief Planning Officer for Tandridge District Council, Piers Mason, said: "The Piers Mason, said: "The application is still under consideration and we are carefully considering the proposal against the Council's adopted policies, while taking account of the comments we have received. It is important to strike a healthy balance between keeping the existing stock of employment land within the district to help maintain its viability and vitaland allowing

release of land for alternative uses where that proves to be the most suitable option.

"We do have policies in the Development Plan which seek to keep suitably located commercial sites, particularly where they remain in use and are viable. It does not appear any research has been carried out to look at the viability of the site for either the existing use, or an alternative commercial use and we will have to consider whether the site is unsuitably located for commercial purposes as part of making a decision."

Man charged with Caterham stabbing

A 20-year-old man from Caterham has been charged following an incident on Sunday 8th May at around 8.20pm in the Croydon Road area of Caterham.

Liam Chambers, 20, from Caterham has been charged with a Section 18 GBH, affray and possession of an offensive weapon. Chambers is due to appear at Guildford Crown Court on Thursday 2nd June for a preliminary hearing.

Another three men, who are all in their late teens, have been bailed until Thursday 9th June pending further enquiries.

The victim, a man in his 40s from Caterham who suffered stab wounds as a result of the incident, has been discharged from hospital. There is still time to have your say on the CR3 Neighbourhood Plan

The residents of Caterham, Chaldon and Whyteleafe are being asked to express their views on the first draft of the CR3 Neighbourhood Plan before the deadline of 23.59 on Friday 10th June.

As featured in the May edition of The Caterham and District Independent, the Neighbourhood Plan sets out the local issues and needs identified by volunteers, who are known as the CR3 Forum, during the course of their research over the last four years. Once the final version is officially adopted, the Neighbourhood Plan will become part of Tandridge District Council's set of policies that are used to make planning decisions in the area, giving the CR3 community a significant role in future planning and decision making for the area. The only other area of Tandridge to have produced a Neigbourhood Plan is Woldingham.

The first draft of the Neighbourhood Plan ('The Pre-submission CR3 Forum Neighbourhood Plan 2013-2035') can be viewed online at www.cr3forum.org.uk or

printed versions are available at Caterham-on-the-Hill and Caterham Valley libraries.

The significance of the Neighbourhood Plan was emphasised to the audience at the Chaldon Annual Village Meeting held on Thursday 19th May. However, members of the audience expressed the view that people were being put off from reading and commenting on the document because it had so many pages.

In response, it was explained that the Neighbourhood Plan is very large and detailed because it covers several areas such as housing, transport, education and retail. People are not expected to comment on the whole document, but can read the sections that are of particular interest and comment on those.

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
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Kaitlyn is crowned Caterham's new May Queen

Caterham will be the first town in Surrey to have its own town flag, so this in a unique opportunity to be part of a lasting legacy for Caterham.

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Record Inheritance Tax bills in the last tax year are a timely reminder of the need for good estate planning.

It is not just because of David Cameron's

family that Inheritance Tax (IHT) planning has been in the news recently.

Figures released by HMRC confirm that, in the last tax year, the government benefited from IHT to the tune of £4.6 billion¹. It is the first time annual revenues have exceeded £4 billion and represents a 21% increase on the amount of tax paid in the previous tax year. The income received by the Treasury from IHT has soared by 70% in the last five years.¹

The boost to the Treasury's coffers is a timely reminder of the damaging effect death duties can have on families' plans to create and pass on wealth, and also that there are perfectly legitimate ways of mitigating IHT through foresight and careful financial planning.

While most assets have risen in value since 2009, the IHT nil-rate band has remained fixed at £325,000 per person (£650,000 for couples), so it's not surprising that the number of families paying IHT has risen.

The Office for Budget Responsibility (OBR) reports that housing assets now account for around half of the value of estates notified for probate, highlighting the impact that rising property prices have had on IHT receipts.

In his Budget last summer, Chancellor George Osborne announced the introduction of a new main residence nil-rate band for the main home when it is bequeathed to a direct descendant. This new band will add £100,000 to the threshold from April 2017, and will rise in stages to £175,000 in the 2020/21 tax year.

In the meantime, IHT receipts are expected to rise to £5.6 billion per year by 2020/21², despite the concession for home owners.

The introduction of the main residence nil-rate band will certainly help families reduce their liability to IHT, but it needs to be considered alongside fundamental estate planning such as writing a Will, establishing trusts where appropriate, and making use of annual exemptions like gifting.

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




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

The spice garden of India

Kerala is a beautiful region in south west India and the port, Cochin, is the commercial capital. It is the home of chef, Jinson Paul, who grew up with traditional Keralan cuisine. He uses authentic Keralan cooking techniques and recipes in his kitchen at The Cochin so that diners can experience many of the region's exotic recipes for themselves.

When my daughter Jenny and I visited the Cochin recently, we both tried South Indian dishes that were completely different from what we normally ate when going out for a curry.

We were recommended the Boiled Egg Roast to share for a starter where the eggs are dipped in batter, then deep fried and served with a creamy, spicy sauce, served on a banana leaf. We agreed it was a dish that we would both highly recommend.

We also tried the Drumstick Soup made of lentils, shallots, ginger, garlic and curry leaves which was a lovely, light and tasty starter. Jenny also had the Lamb Coconut Fry starter which had a very generous quantity of lamb and Jenny said had lots

For our main courses, Jenny had the Neerulli Prawn Curry made with King Prawns and cooked in a special sauce made with shallots. It is one of the chef's special dishes and went beautifully with our side dishes of Mushroom Masala and Beetroot with Coconut. I had a dish that is not on the menu - a Mixed Vegetable Curry that Jinson Paul prepared with a great selection of vegetables including green beans, carrots and potatoes. We shared a portion of Appam bread which is gluten free, made simply from rice and a small quantity of lentils. Nicole explained that the chef can adapt any dish to individual customer's tastes or dietary requirements, if they have a nut allergy for example, as every meal is freshly prepared once it has been ordered.

A summer sizzler was exactly what I enjoyed when I visited The Curry Leaf Indian and banana and sultanas.

Bangladeshi restaurant in Old My Special Sizzler Mixed Veg-Coulsdon recently. I have found that Indian restaurants always have an excellent choice of vegetarian dishes and the dish I chose when I visited with my friend Jill, was excellent.

After sharing a starter of tasty spicy and plain papadoms, Jill chose one of the `Specials of the Day' the Honey Lamb, and I chose one of the 'Tandoori Ka Kamal Sizzling' dishes, the Special Sizzler Mixed Vegetable.

To go with our main courses we chose Sag Paneer (spinach with cheese) and Bindi Churchuri (fried Okra) as our vegatable side dishes, along with a portion of Fruit Rice and a Peshwari Naan.

Once Jill's Honey Lamb and all the side dishes were on the table, our waiter, Dewan, brought my sizzling vegetables

to the table on a separate trolley and served them onto my plate, still sizzling. The array of food looked sumptuous and tasted as good as it looked. Jill said that she was not normally very keen on rice but she tried the Fruit Rice following my recommendation. She agreed with me that it made a lovely change to have rice with dried fruit in, including dried slices of

etable was nice and firm, not over-cooked and soft. The texture and flavour of the vegetables, which included tomato, potato, big chunks of onion, pepper and aubergine, was perfect (and only cost £7.40 for a huge plateful). I had to make a space on my plate specially for the vegetable accompaniments and rice. Jill and I both agreed that the Sag Aloo was a lot creamier than we had experienced elsewhere, and the Okra was rather unusual and interesting. It was medium spicy and was also cooked just right so that it was not too soft. Jill said the sauce much as you like, including for her Honey Lamb was very rich and fragrant and really nice. It is one of the several new additions to the Specials of the Cuisine section of the menu.

The restaurant is very proud of the award won by their chef for BCA Chef of the Year. It is indeed very well deserved!



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
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Audiences pack **Chaldon Village** Hall for 'It's a **Deadly Game'**

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Diary of a **Plantaholic**

All the planning and design is coming to a head now, but before I start putting my plans into action, I take a quick look round the garden. As my saying goes, a bug/weed in time saves 99. I try and work with the weather. If it is sunny and windy, I make sure everything is very thoroughly watered. I think the wind dries plants out as quickly as the sun.

With Chelsea at the end of the gardening term May, "the Chelsea chop" acts as a reminder to cut back late flowering, overly energetic plants that can become very lax and floppy. This works really well on my larger sedums, and as long as it's done fairly promptly, it should not curtail flowering. The lawn did not get much attention until the beginning of May. Warmer, lighter days means it's growing fast, so if the ground is damp, it will be raked and fed. I like the liquid "Evergreen" spray,

that attaches to the hose end. This feed works really quickly, and lasts six weeks. Bare patches have a sprinkling of grass seed on lightly raked soil but protect with chicken wire, as the wood pigeons are quick to snack on the seeds!

Keeping the lawn cut each during summer months should keep it trim, unless drought prevails.

My runner beans, soaked overnight and then kept in nicely damp multi-purpose compost for about a week, hung in a carrier bag in the greenhouse, are now ready to go into my vegetable patch. Cloches kept the soil warm and hopefully nematodes for slugs will mean we get a bumper harvest. I can't wait!


